## Artist Statement



As an artist, I am drawn to the silent strength and layered narratives of the human body—especially the female form—as a vessel of memory, vulnerability, resilience, and transformation. My work seeks to evoke emotional depth through the gesture, posture, and surface of the figure, often using minimal yet expressive forms to convey complex inner landscapes.

Much of my artistic inquiry centers around the tension between containment and liberation. I explore themes of identity, memory, and psychological boundaries through the act of layering—both conceptually and materially. The body, in my work, is often isolated yet expansive, silent yet loud with emotion. Each figure emerges not just as a representation but as a presence—rooted in real experience and transcending it.

Working primarily in mixed media, including printmaking, painting, and drawing, I am especially drawn to the tactility and layering processes that these mediums allow. Through etching, aquatint, and collagraph, I create surface textures that echo the scars, sediments, and emotional residues of the body and psyche. This materiality is essential to my work—it mirrors the internal layering we carry as human beings.

Nature and the everyday environment often inform my visual vocabulary. Fading walls, peeling paint, and organic decay become metaphors for the temporal, transient aspects of human experience. My palette leans toward muted, earthy tones, allowing texture and form to take precedence over color.

While my narratives are deeply personal, they open pathways for broader engagement—inviting viewers to bring their own associations and emotions into the reading of the work. I am not interested in literal storytelling but rather in evoking a sense of empathy, pause, and contemplation.

Ultimately, my work is about navigating inner spaces—about what lies beneath the surface, what remains unsaid, and what is felt in the quiet. It is a continuous process of excavation, of making visible the invisible, and of holding space for the complexity of being.
